E. P. Ingalls House

One of Denmark's oldest and loveliest houses located on Fessenden Hill Road. The ell was built in 1783 and the main house in 1789. Apples from the large orchard were packed in barrels and shipped to England. The house features a wood fan over the door and twelve over eight pane windows.

The Ingalls house is catalogued in "The Denmark Old House Survey" done by the Denmark Historical Society. It is the residence of Mrs. Charles Holmes.
